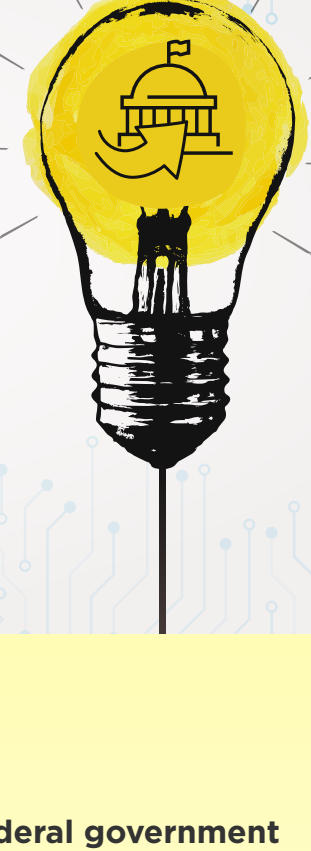

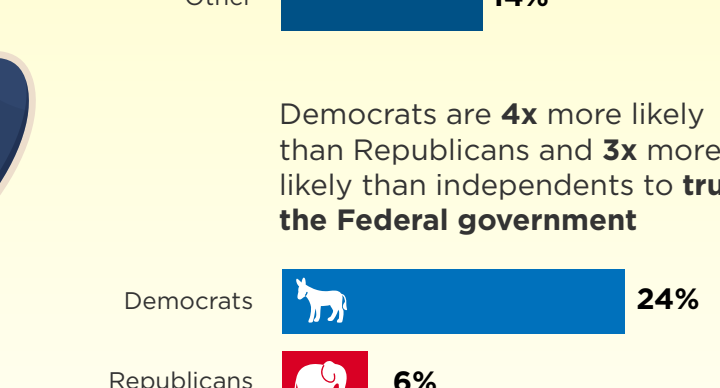

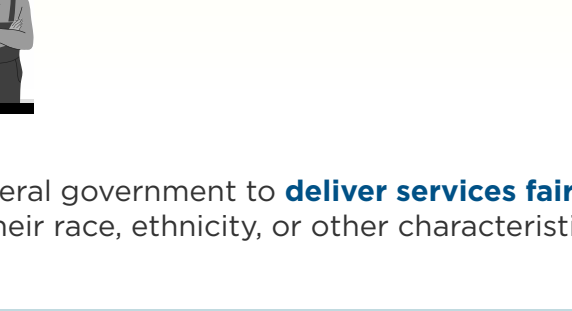
In advance of the event, MeriTalk, in partnership with The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research, surveyed **1,004 American adults** to explore sentiments on trust, policy, and technology.

Trust Issues

Just 15% of Americans trust the Federal government to do what's right most or all of the time



Democrats are **4x** more likely than Republicans and **3x** more likely than independents to trust the Federal government

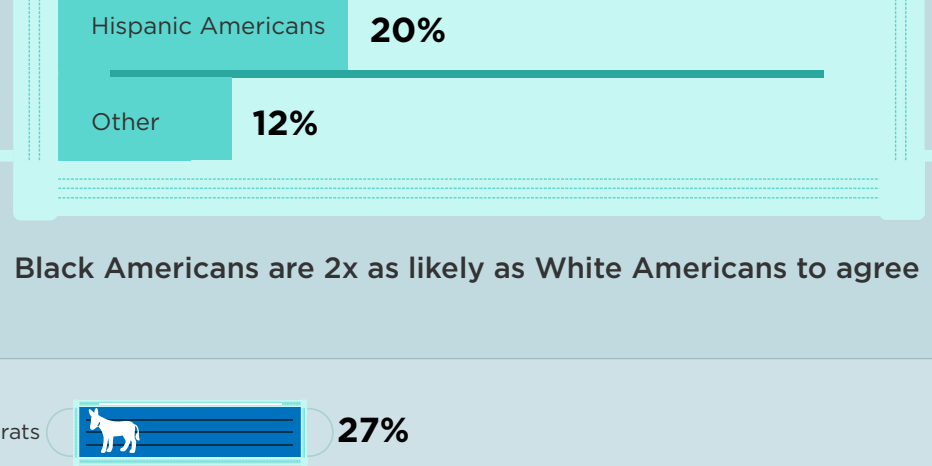


Just 22% trust the Federal government to deliver services fairly to all Americans regardless of their race, ethnicity, or other characteristics

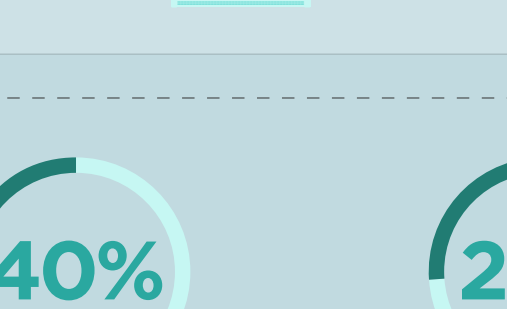
COVID Counterpunch



Just **one in five** feel the Federal government has been **very effective at responding** to the public's needs during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic



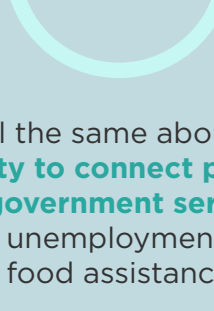
Black Americans are 2x as likely as White Americans to agree



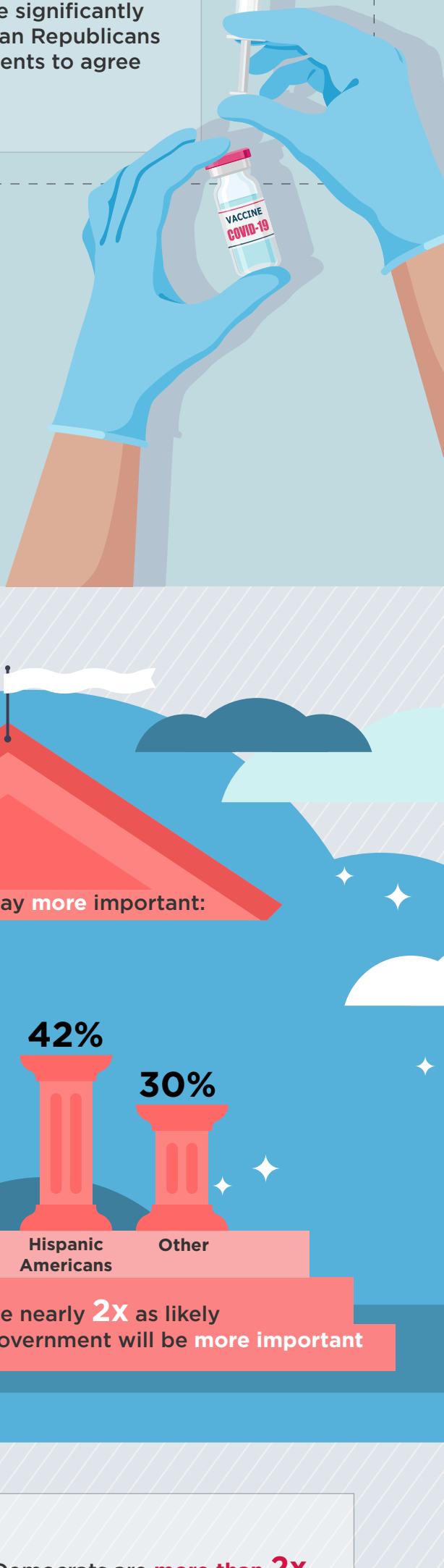
Democrats are significantly more likely than Republicans and independents to agree

Silver Lining

76% say the Federal government will be as important or more important in improving the lives of the American people over the next 10 years

Democrats are **more than 2x** as likely as Republicans to say the government will be more important

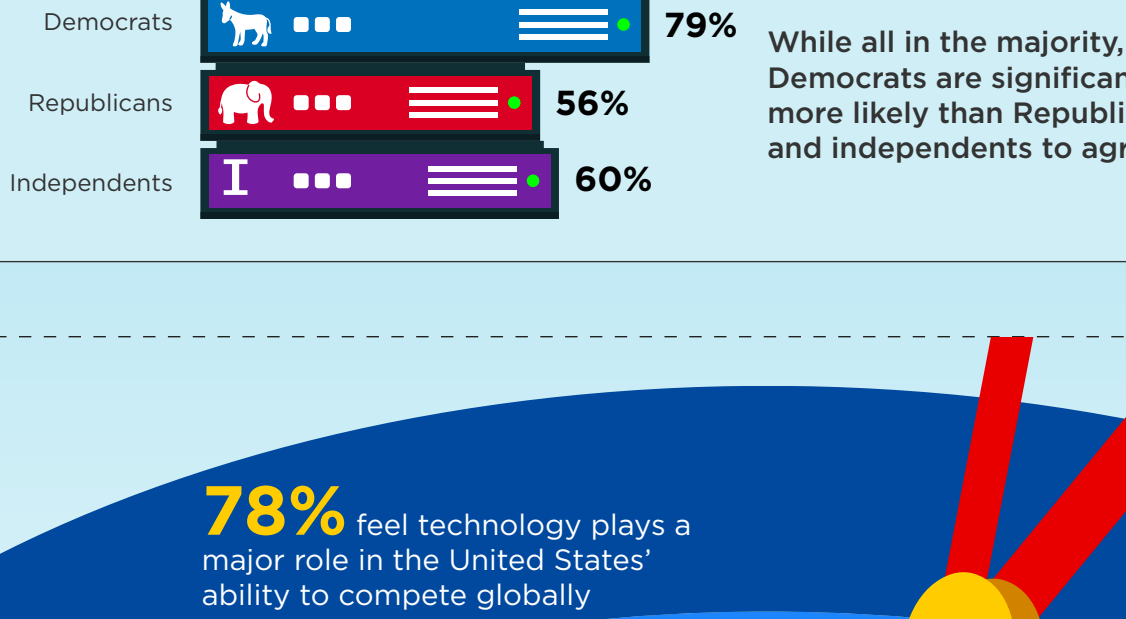

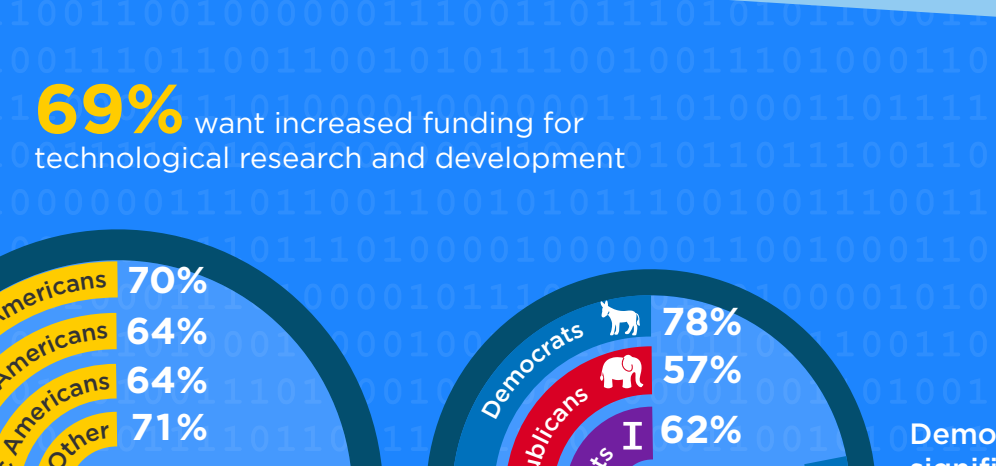
Americans rank **Healthcare #1** regardless of race or ethnicity - but not political affiliation



A Rare Consensus

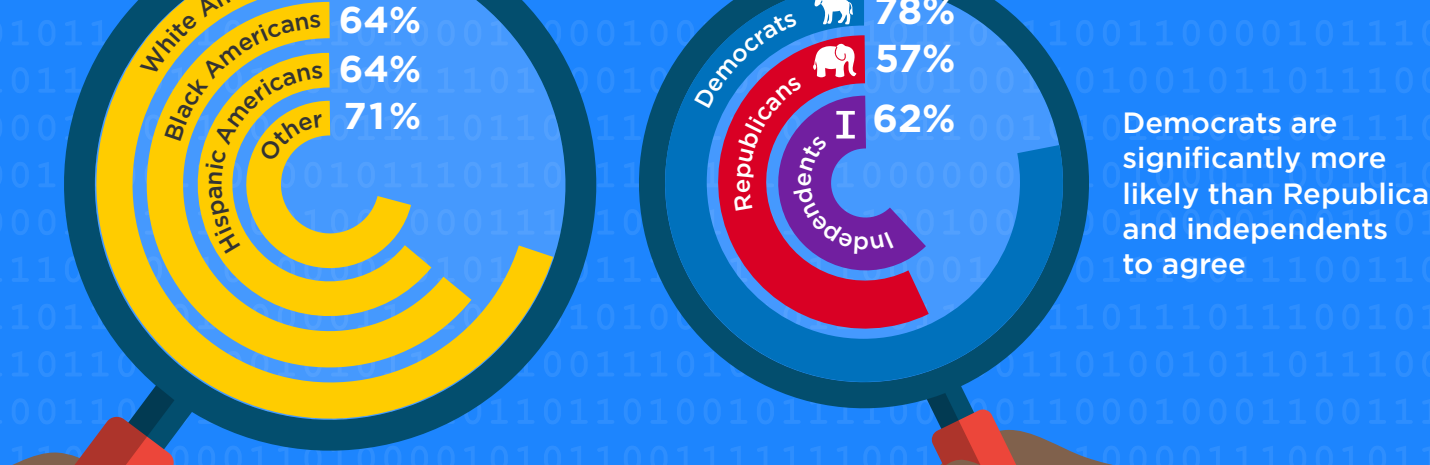
While **just 9%** are confident in the government's ability to spend money in the best interest of the public,

68% say Federal spending on **technology** is worth the investment



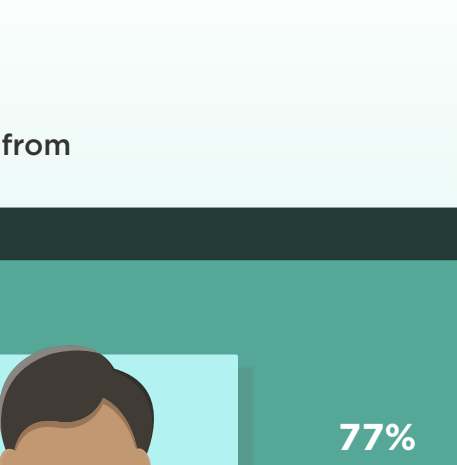
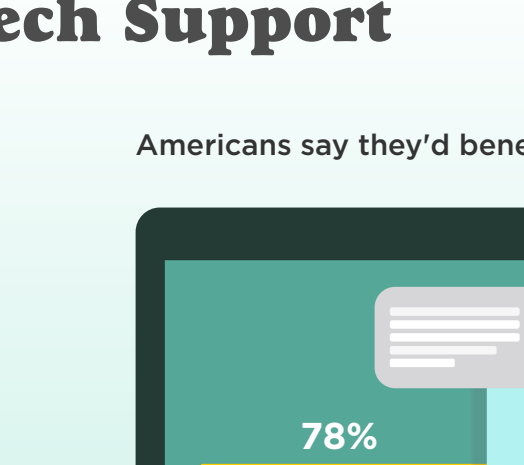
While all in the majority, Democrats are significantly more likely than Republicans and independents to agree

Democrats and Republicans are significantly more likely than independents to agree

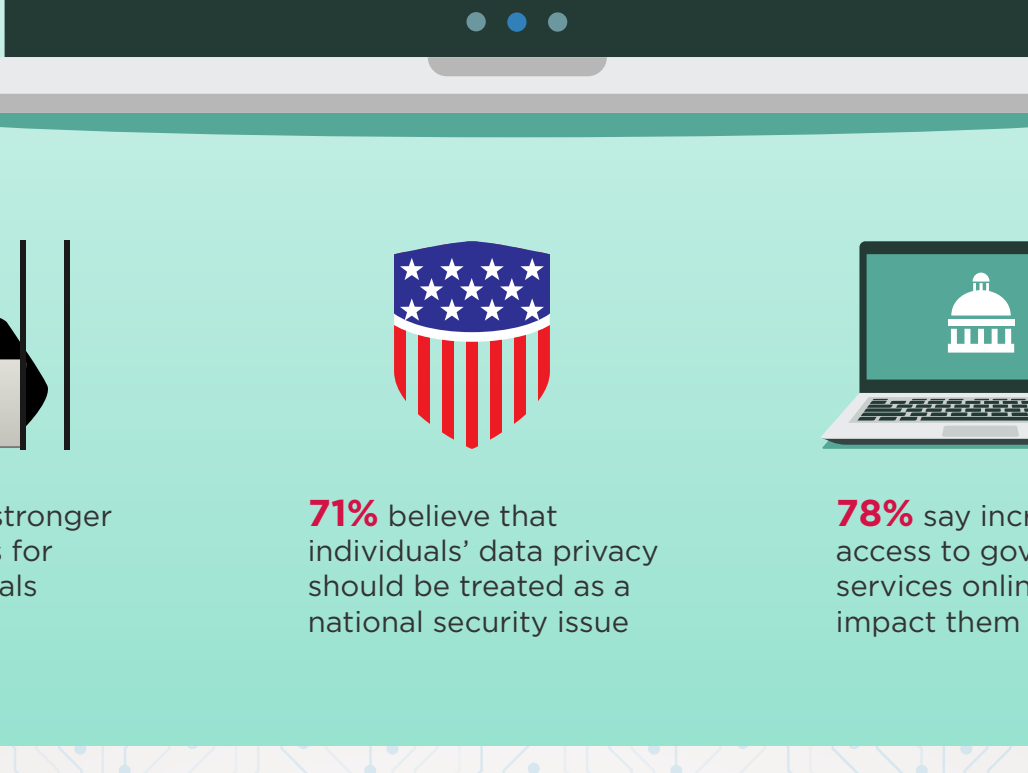
69% want increased funding for technological research and development
